# Nouns: Sustantivos

- A **noun** is a part of speech that names a person, place, thing, idea, action or quality.
- El **sustantivo** es una palabra que nombra o designa a personas, animales, cosas, lugares, sentimientos o ideas.
- En Inglés, tenemos sustantivos contables y no contables.

## Countable nouns

- **Countable nouns** are things that we can count.
- We can put an **'s'** on a countable noun.



a pear



2 pears



an apple



3 apples

# Los sustantivos contables en Inglés

- Los **countable nouns** son aquellos elementos que pueden ser contados de uno en uno utilizando los números.
- Los nombres **contables** tienen forma de singular y plural.
- Ejemplos;
- Apple/ apples: *Manzana / manzanas*
- Monkey / monkeys: *Mono / monos*
- Chair / chairs: *Silla / sillas*
- School / schools :*Escuela / escuelas*
- Tree / trees: *Árbol / árboles*

# Uncountable nouns

## UNCOUNTABLE NOUNS



- nouns which cannot be counted and they usually have no plural
- **food**: cheese, butter, sugar, meat, jam etc.
- **liquids**: coffee, water, milk, tea, oil etc.
- **materials**: gold, iron, wood, paper etc.
- **abstract nouns**: beauty, love, sadness etc.



# Los sustantivos no contables

- Los *uncountable nouns* son aquellos elementos que no podemos contar usando números pero sí utilizando cuantificadores o partitivos.
- Los nombres **incontables** solo tienen forma de singular, habitualmente no llevan artículos pero a veces pueden ir acompañados por some/any.
- **Ejemplos:**
- Food: *Comida*/Milk: *Leche*/Money: *Dinero*/
- Sugar: *Azúcar*/ Time: *Tiempo*.

# Countable & Uncountable Nouns



## Countable Noun



**Can be counted**

E.g: an apple, a school, 1 picture, 2 pictures, etc

**Can take singular or plural verbs**

There **is** a book on the table.

Those houses **are** very big, aren't they?



## Uncountable Noun

**Can not be counted**

E.g: sugar, information, water, understanding, etc

**Always take singular verbs**

There **is** some water in that pitcher.
